Found in the Himalayas, the caterpillar fungus is worth more than its weight in gold. Using the caterpillar fungus trade as an analytical lens, Tsering's research examines the embodied experiences of caterpillar fungus traders situated in the geopolitical backdrop of the Himalayan borderlands. In centering the embodied experiences of the people who engage in caterpillar fungus activities, her research will geographically examine Himalayan geopolitics from below
